Dr. Frey is an internationally regarded demographer, known for his research on migration, and urban and regional demographic changes affecting America, as well as for his expertise on the U.S. Census. Frey's demographic expertise draws from his more than two decades at the University of Michigan where he is on the faculty of the University's Institute for Social Research and Population Studies Center. He has authored well over 100 publications and several books including *Regional and Metropolitan Growth and Decline in the U.S.* (1988) and *America By the Numbers: A Fieldguide to the US Population* (2001). At Michigan he directed projects with the National Science Foundation, National Institute for Child Health and Human Development Center for Population Research, and several other foundations. He is a contributing editor to *American Demographics* magazine.
